Happy New Year! I hope you have enjoyed the holidays. I have been extremely busy. Since the last newsletter I've taken part in three groups shows, all of which are still running. The first is "Everyone's a Critic - Selections from SF Camerawork's Member Critiques." As the title suggests, this is a juried show of photos by those who have participated in a portfolio critique at SF Camerawork, a scary but rewarding experience. For me the highlight of this show was meeting the other photographers. One of the most notable was Ingeborg Gerdes, who made a name for herself in the 1970s-80s with her documentary and landscape photography. She recently retired from UC Santa Cruz after lecturing on photography for nearly a decade. I also had the opportunity to meet Alan George, whose large format photos of Americana, most of which were taken in Alabama, were the show's centerpiece. "Everyone's a Critic" will continue through January 31 at In Color 2, in San Francisco's historic Dog Patch neighborhood.

Another group show in which I'm taking part is "Good Things Come in Small Packages" at Autobody Fine Art, 1517 Park Street, Alameda. When co-owner Jacqueline Cooper invited me to participate, she wrote, "We'd like to keep all work down to around \$250.00 or less, - hey, it's Christmas, it's a recession, let's celebrate." There was fabulous work at affordable prices, and I had to buy a piece, a photograph by <u>Jan Watten</u>. (Good karma: I also sold a piece. Note the tiny, glorious, red dot next to one of my photos at right.) This show runs through January 16th, so there's still time to pick up one of <u>Clint Imboden</u>'s decorative hand grenades.
